Coleman Wilson “Dub” Grubb, Jr. 81 of Spencer died Thursday, October 1, 2009 at Rowan Regional Medical Center.

Born March 21, 1928 in Salisbury, he was the son of the late Morah Fultz Grubb and Coleman Wilson Grubb, Sr.

Mr. Grubb was educated in the Spencer and Salisbury schools and graduated from Boyden High School, Class of 1946. He was an All Star Football player and played in the Shrine Bowl December 1945. He received an Athletic Scholarship at Clemson University, where he was a member of the Gamma Kappa Alpha Fraternity and then attended Catawba College.
