Aunt Emma contacted me when Al died, and there began our year of correspondence with one another. I received my final 6 page letter from Emma yesterday, post marked May 15. A few times I sent her self addressed, stamped envelopes to be sent to my mom and myself. It was really nice to hear from her, and listen to the spirited, intellectually acute, memorable woman that she was. What a gift of a human being. In her last letter she said she was carrying on, and surprised she was still here, and wanted no pity, but was ready to 'be at Peace.' Her wonderfully intuitive sense of humor and outrageously tickled laughter as well as unique way of living her life will be forever in my heart.
