



## Sidney Ray Bernhardt

July 30, 1927 - August 24, 2009

Sidney Ray Bernhardt, 82 of Salisbury died Monday, August 24, 2009 at the Lutheran Home at Trinity Oaks.

Born July 30, 1927 in Rowan County, he was the son of the late Sidney H. and Delma Cruse Bernhardt. He was educated in the Rowan County schools and graduated from Granite Quarry High School in 1944, watch repair school in Spencer and attended Lenoir Rhyne College. He was a veteran of the US Air Force during World War II and served in Germany.

Mr. Bernhardt was employed by the US Postal Service for 36 years and was a Supervisor at the time of his retirement. He later was employed at Rowan Regional Medical Center for 11 years in their Security Department.
