



## Troy Hill Parkman

October 16, 1923 - April 29, 2017

Troy Hill Parkman, 93 of Lexington passed away Saturday, April 29, 2017 at his home.

Born October 16, 1923 in Mitchell Co., GA, he was the son of the late Willie Clyde Parkman and Margaret Elizabeth Mansfield Parkman.

He was educated in the Baconton, GA schools and graduated from Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College, Tipton, GA.

Mr. Parkman was a veteran of the US Army during World War II and received the World War II Victory Medal, the Asiatic Pacific Service Medal with 1 Bronze Star and the American Service Medal. He was a survivor of Iwo Jima where he was in charge of the 506 Triple A Antiaircraft Gun Battalion.

Mr. Parkman was employed in the citrus industry and was Operations Manager/Cold Storage Manager of Snively Citrus in Winter Haven, FL for 30 years before retiring.

For over a decade he was in charge of the video ministry at Life and Praise Temple, Auburndale, FL. He was a member of First Assembly of God, Triangle, VA.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife of 68 years, Marilyn Geneva Campbell Parkman on November 7, 2016; son, Larry Parkman; granddaughter, Rebekah Adams; brothers, Dewey Parkman and Ray Parkman; and sister, Ann Carr.

Those left to cherish his memory are his children, Rev. Brenda Adams and husband Rev. Frank Adams of Hamptonville and Ricky Parkman and wife Cheryl of Lexington; grandchildren, Jennifer Agee and husband Branden of Lexington, Brittany Powell and husband Nick of Winston-Salem, and Miranda Siebeneck and husband Todd of Woodbridge, VA; great-grandchildren, Clyde Agee and Bennett Siebeneck.

Funeral services will be conducted 10 AM – Wednesday (May 3) at the Summersett Memorial Chapel with the Rev. Frank Adams officiating. Interment will follow at the Historic Salisbury National Cemetery with Military Graveside Rites conducted by the NC National Guard and the Rowan Veterans Honor Guard.

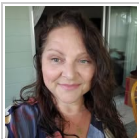
